


INDIGENEITY PROGRAM 2024 ANNUAL REPORT

BRINGING INDIGENOUS PERSPECTIVES TO GLOBAL CONVERSATIONS

Indigeneity is a Native-led Program within Bioneers that promotes Indigenous approaches to solve the Earth's most pressing environmental and social crises. We produce the Indigenous Forum within the Bioneers Conference, original media, educational curricula and catalytic initiatives to support the leadership and rights of First Peoples, while weaving networks, partnerships and alliances among Native and non-Native allies.





INDIGENEITY PROGRAM TEAM



Co-Director, Cara Romero (Chemehuevi), is a nonprofit leader, communicator, change-maker, and award-winning artist. She brings special expertise in working directly with tribes, and in producing cultural events and gatherings. Prior to joining Bioneers in 2011, Cara served as the first Executive Director of the Chemehuevi Cultural Center and was an elected member of the Chemehuevi Tribal Council from 2007-2010. She served as the Chair of the Chemehuevi Education Board and the Chemehuevi Early Education Policy Council. With degrees in Cultural Anthropology and Fine Art Photography, Cara has won numerous awards for her photography, including the Southwestern Association of Indian Art's Best of Classification award (twice), has published in National Geographic, and is widely collected by public and private institutions worldwide.



Co-Director, Alexis Bunten, PhD (Unangan/Yup'ik), is a writer, media-maker, and curriculum developer. After receiving a BA in Art History, Alexis returned to Alaska, where she worked at the Sealaska Heritage Institute and the Alaska Native Heritage Center. Subsequently, Alexis earned a PhD in Cultural Anthropology. She has published widely about Indigenous and environmental issues in academic and mainstream media outlets. Alexis has won several awards from the National Science Foundation, Ford Foundation, MacArthur Foundation, Bristol Bay Native Corporation, New England Book Award, A Center for the Study of Multicultural Children's Literature Best Book of 2023, Rise: A Feminist Book Project List Selection, among others. She has been with Bioneers since 2016.



Program Manager, Nazshonnii Brown-Almaweri (Diné), is a farmer and educator from West Oakland. She has worked as a STEM tutor, media educator, and youth program assistant for the American Indian Child Resource Center. She's a farmer at the Gill Tract Community Farm, a volunteer-led farm that provides food, medicine, and green spaces to the community. Nazshonnii is passionate about STEM education and advocates for exposure and opportunities for historically excluded people, especially Black and Native youth. As an educator, Nazshonnii has provided middle and high school youth with the space to learn about STEAM at the intersection of ancestral knowledge and their lived experiences, creating space for youth to thrive in disciplines like engineering.



Special Project Coordinator, Britt Gondolfi, JD (Houma Descent) is a children's book author, community organizer, and mother. Britt has worked with the Bioneers Indigeneity Program since 2017 as a facilitator for the Intercultural Conversation Program. She joined the Bioneers Rights of Nature initiative as an intern while in law school and subsequently as a Special Projects Coordinator to bring together Tribal organizers, youth, and allies to advocate for the Rights of Nature in Indian Country. Britt recently took a stand for women's rights, running a fierce campaign for State Senate in Louisiana. Her first Children's book, "Look Up! Fontaine the Pigeon Starts a Revolution," is a hilarious social commentary on digital distraction and fight to save us from ourselves.

LETTER FROM THE INDIGENEITY TEAM

Dear Friends of Indigeneity:

As we look forward to 2025, we are so proud to share our accomplishments in 2024.

With your generous support, we celebrated another banner year for the Indigeneity Program elevating Indigenous voices and solutions, bringing youth and communities together and making inspiring Indigenous-focused content accessible to all people through our original curriculum and media.

The Indigeneity Program grew in 2024 to 4 full-time and 1 part-time staff members, who bring decades of experience in networking across Indian Country, community organizing, cross-cultural communications, and media making. This highly talented and capable group of women work together to bring a one-of-a-kind collection of Indigenous-focused content that simply cannot be found outside of Bioneers.

Last year heralded Bioneers' 35th year and the 17th Indigenous Forum! In response to overwhelming demand from our Bioneers community, we increased the size of the Indigenous Forum (*but it was still standing room only).

We hosted Native Peoples from over 115 diverse Tribal Nations, and the connecting and networking was prolific and joyful. Our Indigenous participants noted that, rather than being peripheral to the Conference, their experience was that they were in partnership, engaging with the event in vitality and appreciation. We brought Indigenous Speakers' presentations, writings, and films beyond the Bioneers Conference through our web platform, making original Indigenous content easily accessible around the world.

We were thrilled to offer two new courses on the Bioneers Learning Platform, Being a Good Relative: Allyship with Indigenous Peoples and Indigenizing the Law.

We provided life-changing opportunities to Native youth to attend the Bioneers Conference and other events curated exclusively for them.

We mobilized knowledge around the Indigenous Rights of Nature movement.

We disseminated information and resources to grow the Indigenous Rights of Nature movement through numerous events and presentations across Indian Country.

We are most proud of expanding our "Native Youth Ambassadors" initiative from 1 Tribal youth group to 6, all of whom are passionate about stewarding their ancestral homelands for generations to come.

Of course, we couldn't have done any of this without the support from the staff members within the broader Bioneers Organization who uplift our program every day of the year.

What We Are Looking Forward to in 2025

We are thrilled to share a sneak peek of a few of our upcoming plans. You do not want to miss the Bioneers Conference Mainstage and Indigenous Forum in 2025. Expect to see influential Indigenous changemakers from elected officials to artists, traditional knowledge bearers, and more.

In the spirit of honoring youth-led environmental movements, we are shifting our Indigenous Rights of Nature strategy from solely focusing on creating groundbreaking media and educational materials to providing necessary resources and catalytic experiences to Indigenous Youth.

We can't give it away just yet, but we are producing a major written work featuring Indigenous wisdom from heretofore unpublished works by leading culture bearers from around the world.

Since its inception, Bioneers has been fundamentally shaped by Indigenous knowledge, participants, and partners, the original "Bioneers." Bioneers' Nativeled Indigeneity Program invites allyship to support the leadership, rights and cultural survival of First Peoples.

Our program creates live events, media, curriculum, and catalytic initiatives to support the leadership and rights of First Peoples while weaving networks, partnerships, and alliances.

We co-produce the annual Bioneers Conference and the world-renowned Indigenous Forum. We adapt these presentations and events into radio shows, TV broadcasts, videos, media collections, articles, blogs, curricula, and books.

We coordinate life-changing experiences for youth through our Native Youth Leadership Program, introducing participants to new ideas, role models, and each other to foster transformative learning. Indigeneity is a

Our Indigenous Rights of Nature initiative mobilizes knowledge through original resources, programs, and InterTribal events. Our flagship Native Youth Ambassadors Program supports youth in leading efforts for their Tribes to protect species and ecosystems.

Through these efforts, many of our Indigenous partners have achieved international acclaim and policy change through the environmental and social justice campaigns they champion at the Bioneers Conference and Indigenous Forum. More and more people are recognizing that "Indigenous issues" are all of our issues and that Indigenous pathways to community, spiritual, and ecological restoration have the power to solve our biggest global problems.

BIONEERS LEARNING

Participants experience Bioneers year-round through the platform, connecting with peers from around the world to build skills for social and environmental change.

In 2024, Bioneers Learning partnered with the Indigeneity Program to offer two unique and innovative courses: Being a Good Relative: Allyship with Indigenous Peoples and Indigenizing the Law.



Being a Good Relative: Allyship With Indigenous Peoples

This 10-week Learning Journey addressed questions including: "What is an ally?" and "How do we create spaces where genuine collaboration for social change is possible?"

Indigenizing the Law

The 6-week workshop examined the prominent cases, laws, and legal theories that make up "Federal Indian Law" while exploring the intersections between the movements for Native Sovereignty and the Rights of Nature.

NATIVE YOUTH LEADERSHIP

An umbrella program, the NYLP coordinates three initiatives, "Healing for Food and Land Justice," Intercultural Conversations, and Native Youth Ambassadors.

"Healing Together for Food and Land Justice" gathers Native, B.I.POC., and migrant youth to participate in special events throughout the year from the greater San Francisco Bay Area.

Intercultural Conversations brings diverse youth together virtually and in person for cross cultural exchange centered on Indigenous themes.

Native Youth Ambassadors provide leadership opportunities for Indigenous youth groups to bring the Rights of Nature movement to their communities.

Each year, we invite all NYLP participants to come together at the Bioneers Conference offering need based scholarships to cover registration,

INTERCULTURAL CONVERSATIONS (IC)

Intercultural Conversations (IC) fosters youth leadership and facilitates cross-cultural exchange between Native and non-Native youth via Indigenous-centered discussions and original curricula developed by Indigenous culture bearers.


Since its inception in 2017, the Intercultural Conversations initiative has served 358 youth towards our goal of serving 400 by 2026. In 2024, we partnered with 7 groups serving a total of 85 youth from across the nation.

At the Bioneers Conference, we dedicate one evening to sharing culture and gifts during our annual potluck. Youth groups create and present dishes from their cultural traditions such as gumbo, poi, fry bread, Lūʻau, Arepas, blue cornmeal pancakes, peach cobbler, chicken karahi, roasted sweet potatoes, and corn cakes made from a recipe passed down from James Beard-winning, Mashpee-Wampanoag chef, Sherry Pocknett. Throughout the event, youth and facilitators share cultural performances from song to dance, poetry, and more, cementing intertribal connections and friendships that last far beyond the 3 days of the Annual Bioneers Conference.

CATALYTIC INITIATIVE INDIGENOUS RIGHTS OF NATURE



OVERVIEW

Tribal Nations across the United States are codifying traditional knowledge to honor the Rights of Nature and affirm their rights to protect their ancestral homelands. The Indigenous Rights of Nature Initiative (IRoN) bolsters Tribes' ability to self-determine laws and practices to safeguard threatened ecosystems. Over the past six years, the Bioneers Indigeneity team has developed educational materials –from guidebooks to articles, radio shows, and videos– to support Tribes interested in adopting Rights of Nature policies. This initiative has evolved into a program focused on youth leadership, offering funding, resources, tools, and collaborative experiences to inspire a movement to "Indigenizing the Law."

NATIVE YOUTH AMBASSADOR PROGRAM

Bioneers Indigeneity program knows that youth are the most powerful advocates for paradigm-shifting legal movements because they will inherit the failures of our currency system. In the spirit of honoring youth-led environmental movements, we are shifting our strategy from solely focusing on creating groundbreaking media and educational materials to also providing necessary resources and catalytic experiences to Indigenous Youth on the front lines.

In 2022, the Bioneers Indigeneity Program and the Mashpee Wampanoag Tribe collaborated on a Rights of Nature initiative to protect herring. Bioneers sponsored community gatherings, provided honorariums and supported youth participation in events, including an interTribal "Herring Camp" in Alaska and Climate Week in New York. At the camp, the youth group drafted a resolution declaring the Rights of Herring, which the Tribal Council adopted unanimously. Subsequently, the youth organized a Rights of Herring Declaration Day to plan to restore herring ponds and runs in coordinating local stakeholders and their Tribe.

Inspired by the success and dedication of this Mashpee Wampanoag youth group, our IRoN initiative expanded the Native Youth Ambassador Program (NYAP) to serve six Native Youth organizations from 2024 through 2025. Each cohort receives grants, travel scholarships, and educational resources to bring the Indigenous Rights of Nature movement to their communities. We also support them to attend the annual Bioneers Conference to connect, collaborate, and ally with the other cohorts and Indigenous youth.



We are proud to say that 40% of our IRoN operating budget went to youth organizing grants, 33% to youth travel scholarships, and 27% to advocacy and the creation of IRoN media. We are looking to fully fund this program next year at \$500,000.00
